## Hermitage By Daniel Baker

It has been an active and exciting time for the Hermitage program. Last summer 160 acres were donated to CCA to bring the hermitage land to 600 acres. Then a challenge donation was matched that brought in \$10,000 to construct the Jim and Pat Corbett Retreat and Research Center at the Windmill. When complete the Center can be reserved by CCA and Saguaro-Juniper for solitaries, couples, and small groups. The Corbett Center will be in the style of David and Pearl's homestead

with an 8' x 16' cottage, wood stove, rain water catchment and compost toilet. This should help acquaint sojourners with simple living, a desire expressed by a recent sojourner (see reflection) and in the original bylaws: It should also be a place where sojourners can learn to live harmoniously within an untamed community of



plants and animals and to work in community to care for these lands. In seeking to integrate sojourners into a wild land community, CHA is guided by the need to heal the separation between civilized humanity and the earth. Beginning construction of the Corbett Center and maintenance on the Leitner-Gonzales straw bale hermitage is scheduled for later this year.



Perhaps our most significant achievement for 2014 was the creation



relentless efforts against the SunZia Southwest Transmission Project, which the federal government formally approved down the west side of the San Pedro River in January 2015. Our greatest chance of stopping it now appears to be the project's lack of economic feasibility. Mick gave presentations on the CCA and Lower San Pedro Watershed Alliance to the Arizona Game and Fish Commission in March and to the Altar Valley Conservation Alliance in May. He also presented a poster on mesquite water use in October at the annual conference of the Arizona Riparian Council and completed a report and information sheet to accompany it. These are now available on the CCA website. We had booths at the Lower San Pedro Ecofest at Winkelman in April and at Tucson Audubon's Bird and Wildlife Festival in August. We also commented on the USFWS's critical habitat proposal for the Yellow-Billed Cuckoo and continued our remote wildlife photography and ORV (off-road vehicle) monitoring project. 


